

Reducing Dropout Rates Among Adolescent Northern Nigeria Girls Through Community-Based Programs and Support Systems

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Abstract: Reducing dropout rates among adolescent girls in Northern Nigeria is a critical endeavour that requires focused attention and strategic interventions. The education landscape in this region faces numerous challenges, with socio-economic barriers and cultural norms often hindering girls' access to and continuation of schooling. This article adopted descriptive research where data were collected from existing literature, it shows that strategies such as involvement with Community-Based Programs, Mentorship and Guidance Programs and Skill Development Initiatives for Empowerment can reduce the rate of adolescent girls' school dropout. It concludes that by harnessing the power of community-based programs and support systems, we can make significant strides in reducing dropout rates among adolescent girls in Northern Nigeria, also through collaborative efforts, strategic interventions, and a commitment to empowering girls with education, where a more inclusive and equitable educational landscape that enables all girls to thrive and reach their full potential.

Girls' education, says Bendini and Devercelli, eds., (2022), is about more than simply getting girls to school; it's also about making sure they're safe while they study, that they finish high school, and that they have the skills to be successful in the workforce. Girls who have access to quality education are better equipped to navigate a dynamic and unpredictable world, make wise choices for themselves and their families, and have a positive impact on local and global economies. Regardless, there are a lot of obstacles that prevent millions of females from getting an education, especially in poor nations (Madu and Obi, 2021). School dropouts are a pressing problem that scholars and politicians throughout the world are focussing on. According to Kiprianos and Mpourgos (2022), students are considered dropouts if they do not return to their original educational institution or complete their degree. Both human lives and social and economic development are negatively impacted by this occurrence (Ainaet al., 2022). Because it keeps females trapped in cycles of poverty and inequality and

limits their chances for empowerment and growth, dropping out has a disproportionately negative effect on girls, devastating because it keeps people mired in poverty and inequality and prevents them from breaking free and moving up the social ladder (De Schutter et al., 2023).

In terms of human development and gender equality, Nigeria ranks 158th and 134th, respectively, indicating that the nation is very impoverished, as such, there is a huge gender gap in the chances available to Nigeria's 80.2 million female and female-identifying youth. It should come as no surprise that gender inequality is pervasive in Nigerian society (Lawan, 2022). The assessment was conducted in the northern Nigerian states of Kano, Jigawa, and Katsina, which adhere to the local interpretation of Sharia Law. This interpretation can be quite strict and limits the opportunities available to women and girls, including their access to resources, their ability to have a say at home, and their say in who makes decisions. Northern Nigeria's Hausa-dominated society is deeply patriarchal and has a long history of limiting women's participation in the official economy and labour. Oftentimes, men—fathers, brothers, male relatives, and groups of male

youth—control women's independence by defining societal notions of shame, isolation, and respectability (Hunt, 2023). Nonetheless, women do take part in the informal sector's cash-based economy via door-to-door hawking or low-return home-based economic activity in rural agriculture, small family businesses, crafts, commerce, and services. When it comes to most measures of social and economic advancement, women in Nigeria are behind males. They are disproportionately represented among the impoverished, jobless, and oppressed. Girls make up 58% of primary school enrolment and males 64%. Of those enrolled in secondary school, 22% are female and 29% are male (Ibeji, 2023).

Just 4% of Northern women who finish high school go on to get a bachelor's degree. In the North, where the gender gap is worse, half of all brides get married before they are 16 and most expect to have a baby in their first year of marriage. When it comes to vocational training and skill development, girls face significant barriers that prevent them from gaining the economic assets and financial stability that they may benefit from. Rural and urban women are quite different. Approximately 60% to 70% of Nigeria's rural workforce consists of women and 54 million out of 80.2 million of these women live and work in rural regions (Nwakesiri and Obasi, 2019). Similarly, the North and the South are markedly different in terms of geography. Despite the South-centralization of Nigeria's oil riches, the nation as a whole remains impoverished. In Northern Nigeria, $\frac{2}{3}$ of the population lives below the poverty line, whereas in Southern Nigeria, $\frac{2}{5}$ of the population does. The South has far superior results in terms of human development for women and girls. The North West, where the evaluation was conducted, has a poverty rate of 77%, which is higher than the South West's 59% and the national average of 69%. The North West has the worst rate of economic growth and the greatest rate of poverty year after year (Ogunniyi, Olagunju and Asaleye, 2019). In the 1990s, around 75% of Kano's factories closed their doors for good. Micro, small, and medium-sized businesses are the backbone of Nigeria's economy, while the northern regions account for less than 20% of the country's industrial capacity (with 70% of that capacity located in the states of Kano and Kaduna), with a total population of 150 million, more than half of Nigeria's residents are youths (Gwaison, 2021). The North West has an alarmingly high rate of youth unemployment as the majority of Nigerian youths, who earn their livelihood in the informal sector, are considered economically inactive since one out of ten of the six million people who join the labour market every year do not find jobs.

The phenomenon of adolescent girls' dropout in Kaduna State is a critical issue that requires thorough understanding and targeted interventions. As such, dropout rates among adolescent girls in Kaduna State are a pressing issue that needs to be addressed urgently. According to statistics, Kaduna State has one of the highest dropout rates in Nigeria, with adolescent girls being disproportionately affected (Phinos and Chukwueme, 2021).
